1. The Trustees have signed the Sale Listing Agreement (contract) with Evan La Rue, STREET Commercial Real Estate. The listing price will be \$185,000 with terms of 6%.

STREET Real Estate will place a sign on the facility and prepare the marketing materials.

2. The detailed inventory of educational and stored material is underway. The next step will be to inventory all furniture, fixtures and decide on their future use/disposition.

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Transitional Executive Leader report Healthy, Healing, and Whole-y

In a 2009 (!) article of the Presbyterian Outlook, that reported on the health of presbyteries, seminaries and churches, George Goodman, former Executive Presbyter of Peaks Presbytery in Virginia, and Jill Hudson, Mid Council staff at Office of General assembly at the time, said this:

A healthy presbytery, said Hudson, is clear about its mission and aligns its budget to that mission. It is not conflict-driven, but it is not conflict-averse either. It's able to put things in perspective. Conflict doesn't determine what it is about.



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A healthy presbytery knows how to initiate and manage change but does not institutionalize it. If something does not work three years down the line, the presbytery is not afraid to fix it. "Our 21st-century world will not allow" such inflexibility. The presbytery needs to be flexible in structure, to have permeable boundaries and not rigid walls.

Finally, a healthy presbytery views all of its leaders as change agents, not just the executive or the stated clerk.

I would say that the years 2020 and beyond have tested these benchmarks and then some. How do you think the Presbytery is doing? I believe as we read between the lines that the Presbytery does only as well as our churches, their pastors, leaders, members, and volunteers. For many years I have said that spiritually, emotionally, and physically healthy leaders are a key in the formula of what makes a healthy church. If we are to zoom out from there, it would stand to reason that healthy churches AND healthy pastors, CREs, and elders will contribute to a healthy Presbytery. Put another way, the Executive and very small staff cannot be the sole embodiment of the Presbytery. Without the churches and its leaders (pastors, elders, commissioned leaders, other servants, and staff), the Presbytery is a mere shell.

So, how are we doing? I think that we are at a crisis and pivotal turning point. The ways and the wonderful history that got us here is not going to take us forward (my

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favorite part of the 2009 article is that the view is mostly on the windshield with an occasional glance to the rearview mirror). WE need a much broader constituency to move the Presbytery forward and seek a new path. WE must be willing to take even more brave steps into the unknown even though we've already taken some baby steps in that direction. The real transition comes now and into the future, when we must consider changing our structures, our focus and the way we relate to one another and do our work.

My charge to the Presbytery (yes, you!) is to consider one person (or more!) who can serve or lead in our midst... give names to me, Jeremiah Lange (moderatorelect) or Melissa Krabbe (moderator) and areas of expertise and interest. We need Trustees, we need people to work with our churches (COMT) and we need people to serve in more limited time capacities such as ACs, task forces and short -term committees. Elected positions require ordination. There are other assigned tasks that may only require a certain skill set and NOT ordination, so please give us all names and a brief description of interests and abilities and of course, contact information.

The mission and focus is simple: putting our time, energies and funding to strengthen and support our churches and their leadership to grow in faithfulness to the Gospel whether they are stable, growing or even nearing end of life. The harvest is plentiful, the workers have been few...please consider contributing to the health and our future.
